

What is an IEP Goal?

IEP goals or objectives represent a part of a required fluency or list of skills that describe what a student should accomplish during the school year (IEP cycle). Each objective in the IEP goal progression moves the learner through previously unmastered skills and skill gaps that may span multiple grade levels or be more condensed to a specific grade or developmental range.

Teach Tastic IEP goals written to be SMART: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Results-oriented and Time-bound.

By (date), when given multiple-choice object options, the student will select which one is not like the others, improving vocabulary skills from 0/10 work samples out of ten consecutive trials to 8/10 work samples in ten consecutive trials.

Sorting: Objects into categories

By (date), when given objects and sorting graphic organizer, the student will sort objects into categories, improving vocabulary skills from 0/10 work samples out of ten consecutive trials to 8/10 work samples in ten consecutive trials.

Match synonyms

By (date), when given multiple-choice word and match options, the student will match synonyms, improving vocabulary skills from 0/10 work samples out of ten consecutive trials to 8/10 work samples in ten consecutive trials.

Match antonyms to pictures

By (date), when given a missing word question and multiple-choice word options, the student will match antonyms to pictures, improving vocabulary skills from 0/10 work samples out of ten consecutive trials to 8/10 work samples in ten consecutive trials.
